#### STUDENT PICK-UP/ABSENCES

#### **PARENTS WELCOME**

- 3. While lunchtime visits are welcome, parents of our youngest Gryphons are encouraged to avoid this practice early in the school year. Such visits often cause students—and their classmates—to become upset. By allowing your child time to become comfortable with routines before visiting, you are helping your student—and their classmates—to have a more positive school experience.

A common question parents ask is this: We've been a little bit lax with technology in our home, and we are realizing that too much screen time is becoming a problem. How do we unwind the habits we have unintentionally started?

Keith McCurdy suggests that you start slowly. There are some circumstances that require you to go to the backyard and burn everything. This is not one of those things. Pick a day, say, Tuesday, and start no-tech Tuesday! That means no tech at all, no phones, no tablets, no TV. Nobody is on an electronic platform (unless required for work or school—required!). Parents will find that they will have to work hard to discipline themselves, but the reward will be that the board games will come out, children will go outside and they will find other, healthier, things to do. You don't have to reverse bad decisions all at once.
