What is this strange custom, the Blessing of the Animals? If you're new to our community, you may have no idea what this is all about. I'll share it with you. It's part show-and-tell, part Medieval history, and part theology.

Here is the show-and-tell part. The Blessing of the Animals is a fun tradition that provides an afternoon for every child in Grammar through Middle School to bring their pets of all types to share with their friends. Actually, mom or dad have to bring them, because we don't start the circus until the last period of the day at 2:00 pm. What can I bring, you

ask? Anything! As long as the critter is one for whom your child is responsible to give care. We've had everything from dogs and cats, to ducks, chickens, goats, ponies, and geckos. If you've got it, we welcome it.



Where did the idea come from? Our tradition of the Blessing of the Animals descends from the legends surrounding the life of St. Francis of Assisi. GRYPHONS OPEN WATER CERTIFIED

On Sunday, September 22, NCS students, faculty, and parents from the School of Rhetoric completed training to become PADI Open Water Certified scuba divers through instructors Larry Antonacci and Shushawn Schmal from Fluvanna Dive Center.

The training involves 10-12 hours of online coursework; a weekend of confined water diving (15-foot-deep pool); and a weekend of open water diving (Lake Phoenix Scuba Park in Rawlings, VA).

With regular diving, this certification will last a lifetime and opens the door to explore the beauty and creativity of God

hidden below the surface of the water. Many will also travel with NCS to the Bahamas in January with Blackbeard's Liveaboard 65-foot boat to spend a week scuba diving the coral reefs along the Exuma Cays.

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a need for redemption because of human sin. He preached to man and beast the universal ability and duty of all creatures to praise God (a common theme in the Psalms) and the duty of men to protect and enjoy nature as both the stewards of God's creation and as creatures ourselves.

Not surprisingly, on November 29, 1979, Pope John Paul II declared St. Francis the Patron Saint of Ecology. Many of the stories that surround the life of St. Francis say that he had a great love for animals and the environment.

Perhaps the most famous incident that illustrates the Saint's humility towards nature is recounted in the "Fioretti" ("Little Flowers"), a collection of legends and folklore that sprang up after Francis's death. It is said that, one day, while he was traveling with some companions, they happened upon a place in the road where birds filled the trees on either side. Francis told his companions to "wait for me while I go to preach to my sisters the birds." The birds surrounded him, intrigued by the power of his voice, and not one of them flew away. He is often portrayed with a bird, typically in his hand.

What are we teaching our children in this tradition? The first thing we affirm is that the world around us has been created by God. It didn't just happen. Not only did God create the world, but he pronounced it "good," and made it a

dwelling place for man and beast alike. In the first chapter of Genesis, God blessed the world, the animals and mankind, which is to say, he imparted life and wellness to them. Moreover, he gave charge to our first parents, Adam and Eve, to cultivate and guard the garden where he had placed them. In other words humans have a duty to make the world productive and to prevent harm to it. Properly understood, the Christian faith entails environmental concern.

The challenge that Francis brought, following in the way of Paul and ultimately Jesus, was that it is the world that has things upside down and that they were able to see things correctly. Paul proclaimed that Jesus had overthrown the kingdoms of this world. Jesus preferred the cross and resurrection to the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil. Instead of loving the things of this world as an end in themselves (money, power, fame), Francis loved things because he knew that they were expressions of the overwhelming God who had made them and continued to care for them. So Francis could say, "Blessed is he who expects nothing, for he can enjoy everything."

So at New Covenant Schools, we do something that may seem a little funny: we bring our pets to school on St. Francis' Day, the first Friday in October, so that we can bless them. We take the time to say

with Francis that our brother creatures speak sacramentally to us about the love that God bears for us

The whole creation barks, chirps, quacks and howls about the glory of God. Perhaps we should listen to them, at least once a year.
