

### STUDY ABROAD AND TRAVEL AT NEW COVENANT SCHOOLS

Adistinguishing characteristic of a classical, Christian education is the invitation into a deeply immersive and integrated learning experience for students. One of the ways that our program achieves this aim is through our Study Abroad and Travel. The travel opportunities offered to our 9th-12th grade students are a unique feature of our program, giving students the chance to explore with friends and teachers in carefully selected cities and regions around the U.S. and the world. These trips highlight the distinctive curriculum of the New Covenant classroom.

Washington D.C.—Every October, all 9th-12th grade students embark on a two-day overnight trip to our nation's capital with a curriculum that rotates

through a fouryear immersion. After four full years in the SOR, our students will have experienced a significant portion of what D.C. has



to offer. Highlights include a tour of the Library of Congress, the Monument Walking Tour, the National Cathedral, the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception, the Supreme Court, the Capitol building, the National Gallery of Art, the Arlington National Cemetery, and the White House. Students also explore various museums to round out their study.

## Athletic Achievements

New Covenant fall athletics has enjoyed success this season in soccer, volleyball and cross country. Our men's varsity soccer team is one of our strongest ever fielded, and finished the regular season 17-4 and #2 in the state (Division 4), despite being plagued by constant injuries. Punching above their weight against schools in higher divisions, the Gryphons scored wins this fall in tough matches against VES, the Covenant School, and Eastern Mennonite. In the VISAA state tournament our men advanced in the quarterfinals, defeating Fredericksburg at home on Friday night. The team travels to Leesburg on Tuesday to face Veritas School of Richmond in the semifinals. Women's varsity volleyball made it to the conference tournament championship against the Covenant School (for the fourth consecutive year). The Lady Gryphons took second place. Volleyball begins its state tournament tomorrow in Chesapeake. Cross country runners competed on Friday in the final conference meet, the men placing 5th out of 9 teams and the women placing 5 out of 7 teams. Michael Seckman was named First Team All-Conference and Gia Barlow earned Second Team All-Conference.


### HONORARIA

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All students enjoy the Kennedy Center for an evening symphony performance. This trip is built into the cost of tuition.

Cultures of Rome—As a classical, Christian school it is only fitting that a study abroad opportunity to Italy be available. This trip remains high on students' interest list and is highly



subscribed. Students explore the ruins of the Colosseum and view the breathtaking artifacts of the Vatican, bringing the classroom dramatically alive. Original art, architecture, and historic sites from the past 2,000 years create an awe-inspiring and beautiful awareness. Held every even year during J-term, this trip is guided by an educational tour company with on-site guides, and benefits from years of expertise and networking to provide the best possible experience for student groups. This trip is fee-based.

Marine Science—The sciences are a key feature of the New Covenant Schools curriculum. Some of our students have chosen career paths based on their science trip experiences, and this is especially true of the marine science trip. Held every odd year during J-term, students prepare by gaining scuba dive certification, and travel to the Bahamas for a live-aboard trip where they participate in multiple dives per day. Students learn about major marine ecosystems and current environmental issues therein. Upon completion they

earn their PADI scuba certificate! This trip is also fee-based.

Senior Trip: Out West!—After graduation, our newly-minted alumni hop on a plane for a truly unforgettable bonding experience out West, making lasting memories with their friends. The week highlights Arizona in all its beauty: the Grand Canyon, a UTV excursion through cacti and tumbleweeds to view the Vermilion Cliffs, a guided boat tour on either the Colorado River or Lake Powell. Breathtaking sites include Horseshoe Bend, a guided tour of red sandstone slot canyons, and a stay in iconic Navajo Nation. Built-in traditions include eating and shopping at one-ofa-kind restaurants, the Navajo Nation Trading Post, Sedona, and a last jaunt in Phoenix. Starting in 8th grade, a portion of tuition is collected for the senior trip, the balance of which is due in the spring of the senior year.

Mission Nogales—For over twenty years, New Covenant Schools has partnered with Cuirim House, a mission started by Brian and Kirsten Donahue in Nogales, Mexico, led by our school chaplain. Only a few short miles from



the U.S. border in Arizona, the mission seeks to provide the neighborhood with support and supplies. Students are challenged and encouraged in their faith through practical acts of service as they work with others in a completely different

cultural setting. Local food and games are a highlight of this experience. This trip runs every other summer in the odd years, and the cost is in addition to the tuition rate.

Amazon Forest in Peru—A new trip in our rotation includes a science-based opportunity in the South American rainforest. Students will tour Lima, enjoy local food and culture of the region, and embark on a multi-day excursion into the rainforest. The rainforest lodge serves as a daily base for hiking and activities to view plant and animal species. Exposure to the various wildlife makes this trip a true once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for our students. This trip will take place for the first time in the summer of 2026 and is planned to rotate every other year in the summer. Led by an educational tour company and on-site guides, it benefits from years of expertise and networking to provide the best possible experience for student groups. The cost of this trip is in addition to the regular tuition rate.
