IN SAECULA SAECULORUM, OR, WORLD WITHOUT END

nless you were raised in a certain religious tradition you might not be familiar with the "Gloria Patri." It's the sentence you hear in some religious settings, which, in English goes like this: "Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost; as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world with end. Amen." Sound familiar? I hope so.

I am certain, however, that you are unfamiliar with the original Latin formulation. Stay with me because I know I'm likely to lose most of you here. I'll just cite the last phrase and get to my point.

It ends this way, "in saecula saeculorum," which being interpreted is, "world without end." Even if you didn't study Latin, you should be able to see the English word we derive from those last two. It's the word secular, not the word for world. The force of the phrase has nothing to do with a place; it has rather to do with time. "World without end" just sounds better than, say, "to the ages of ages." Those "w's" roll off our lips more poetically.

So what's my point? Words change meaning over time, often for good reasons and sometimes bad. In our experience we tend to think of secular as the realm of the non-religious. We unconsciously divide reality into two stories, the religious and the secular, discrete spaces in which one refers implicitly to spiritual matters and the other to material concerns. One space is informed by religious commitments and the other is pretty much left to science. When

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you step into church you expect to hear conversations about redemption or grace. Once in the real world—the secular world—you must have a permit to conduct such conversations.

This has been our reality for some time, but it's a rather recent development in the history of the West. Until a few hundred years ago the word secular never was the opposite of sacred, nor was it nonreligious. It was not a qualitative term; rather it was a temporal term, meaning "pertaining to an age." You wouldn't know that because it changed meaning before you were born. It never meant some space that was neutral or devoid of God, but the change in meaning suggests that "secularism" reset the stages upon which politics, education, athletics, and nearly every other major concern of life is carried out, and are purported to be a neutral zone where there is nothing but bias-free "reality," and most certainly free from religious bias.

Here's an example. I can disassemble and work on my truck with no concern about any deeper meaning attached to a four-wheel drive assembly. I can acknowledge that it has been engineered, but to understand and work on my truck I never need to consult the engineer who designed it. At most I might watch a YouTube video, but the engineer who designed it doesn't engage with me. Moreover, my truck is not reflective of any deeper meaning or significance. Theoretically, it is possible to investigate the world in the same way, to learn about it and leave open the question of whether the whole order has a deeper significance. This posture is the studied and official position of public education, as well as local, state, and federal governments. In that space, everybody's equal. This is the direct outcome of what we call the secular.

There are secularized public spaces; there are secularized beliefs and practices; and now, there is a new development, which is the notion of completely secular conditions for belief itself. In this new belief it is held that all that is necessary for human flourishing

is available to us without reference or appeal to any transcendent authority (read "engineer") or being. Now when we look at nature—the nature of anything we can do so without any preconceived notion as to its order or meaning. If this sounds like a new form of atheism, it is; it's a "functional atheism." The new secular, however, goes even further. In this framework we can actually define nature ourselves and impute our own meaning. And, if that were not far enough, we get to do this in complete separation from one another. If I say I am a boy or a girl, for example, even if my apparent "nature" suggests otherwise, I am most certainly correct in my assertion, and therefore entitled to total equality and protection under the law with no regard to how you might be affected.

Guess what? In this scenario it turns out that the new secular is not neutral at all. This is precisely why we don't trust our politicians anymore. If political authority is no longer about securing God-given rights, what rights are being protected or advanced? They are protecting by force the private "rights" essentially claimed by every individual who, in the new secular, is empowered to determine reality for himself/herself. This is not limited to sexual orientation or gender identity issues. Rather, this is an interpretive grid, a worldview framework that informs athletics, foreign policy, justice, individual wealth and communal responsibilities, education, scientific pursuit, and on and on. Not only is this unworkable, the grinding friction it entails is threatening the stability of our body politic.

This brings us to the Christmas story, the real historical account of how God has from age to age engaged the human race. It's a story that never saw itself as belonging to a space with boundaries. Our claim is that God spanned both spaces in the person of his Son, who being fully God was also fully human. The Latin word "incarnate" means "in flesh." Jesus participates in both realms, material and immaterial. His intrusion into space and time as a man extends his claim from

heaven to earth with comprehensive implications for both spheres. It's a story that purports to explain all of reality in one integrated space over one integrated history. In the secular way of thinking, Jesus is reducible to an imaginary friend that children eventually outgrow. In the Christian way of thinking, Jesus was and is a real man who still retains his humanity as certainly as any living president, the Son of God who became man, and as the historical heir of the Davidic throne claims to be the king of the world. He is not merely the king of your heart. He is to be acknowledged by all human authorities, including Joe Biden or Donald Trump, both of whom operate in predefined spaces which they are not free to neutralize for their own purposes.

There is no difference between the secular and the sacred. Everything is sacred because it has been created by him and for him. His claim over all worlds is total for all time, in *saecula saeculorum*, or world without end. This is the operating presupposition for our educational endeavors, including fixing my truck, and is that which lies at the heart of a classical, Christian education.
